Lebanon Borough Sewerage Authority

Due to Hurricane Sandy, the Lebanon Borough Sewerage Authority's (LBSA) smoke testing of Lebanon Borough will be postponed until the spring of 2013. For further details, please contact the LBSA at 908-236-2704.

In the Spring of 2013, the Lebanon Borough Sewerage Authority (LBSA) will begin the testing of its sanitary sewer system to locate and identify sources of direct inflow to the sewer system. Direct inflow is extraneous water that enters the sewer system through cross connections of roof drainage (leaders and gutters); area-way drains; storm sewer systems or through broken pipe or fittings.

The procedure the LBSA will use to locate and identify these cross connections is Smoke Testing. This procedure is completed during daylight hours by an independent contractor with experienced field crews and the field staff of the LBSA Engineer's office. The procedure uses a blower to introduce the smoke into the sanitary sewer system through system manholes. Exiting smoke is documented and the source of the smoke identified and recorded.

The smoke is a non-toxic petroleum based product that is generated in the blower and forced into the sewer system under pressure. The smoke will normally vent from the system through house vents, but will also vent through the cross connections. The period of the test procedure is short, generally 15 minutes for each set up. You may notice the field crew in the street before and during the test. The field crew is there to conduct the test and to record the results. They can also assist anyone concerned about the test, or if smoke enters the house through a broken pipe (in the house) or dry traps on plumbing.

The documentation of the test includes pictures of the smoke exiting the cross connections. In order for the field crew to obtain the pictures, it may be necessary for one or more members of the crew to go onto private property. Each member will have identification. The procedure is accomplished outdoors. There is no reason for any field crew member to enter any house, unless they are asked to in response to smoke in the house.

The smoke is non-toxic and will not leave any residue. If the plumbing in the house is sound, no smoke will enter the house. You may have sinks or showers, however that you do not use regularly. Smoke will exit from these sinks or showers unless the plumbing trap is full of water. You are asked to run the water to your sink/showers prior to the testing day. You need only run the water for 1-2 minutes to insure the trap is full.

Once the start date is known, LBSA will place a public notice in the local newspapers and post a notice on the Borough Bulletin Board, adjacent to the fire station on Main St. Your cooperation during this necessary testing procedure is greatly appreciated. Lebanon Borough Fire Company

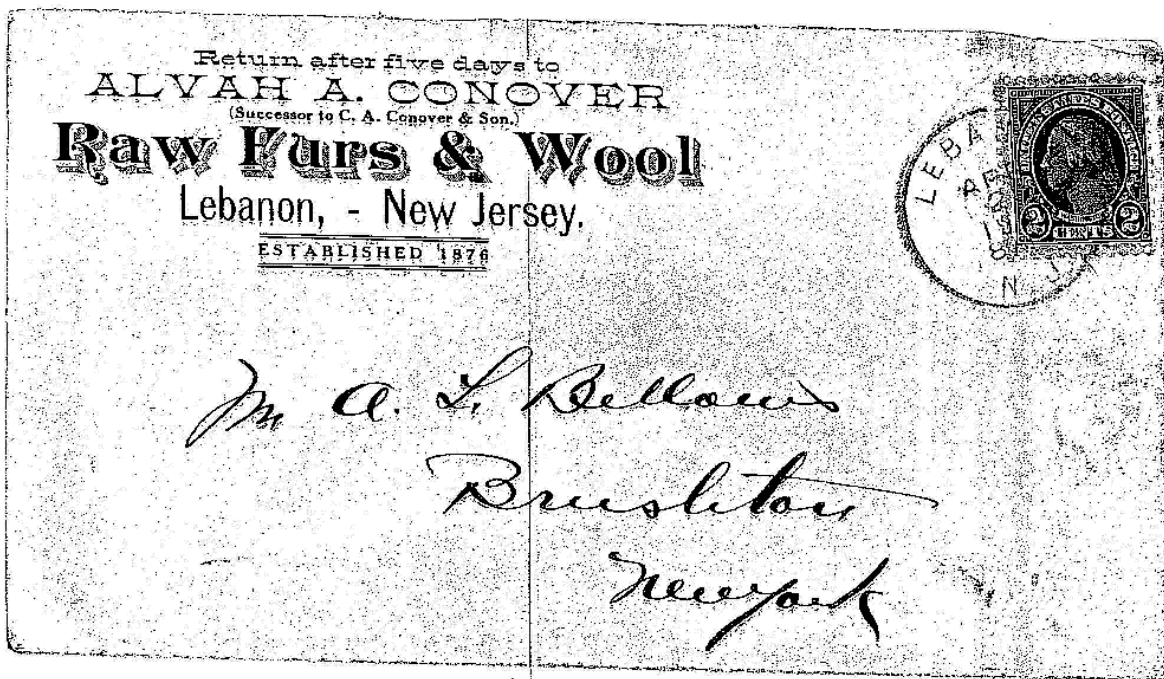
We were all impacted by Superstorm Sandy, which hit New Jersey with a vengeance in late October. With winter fast approaching, we'd also like to remind everyone to shovel a clearing around the fire hydrants on or near their property. If while you shovel you pile it around the hydrant, we will not be able to make access as quickly as necessary in an emergency.

Historical Committee

We have received several new donations. Richard Stryker of Valley Stream, whose grandfather owned the confectionery store, which was destroyed in the 1918 explosion, sent an eerie photo that shows a young man standing on the front steps of the store's foundation looking at the rubble. He also sent a photo of a calendar from the store from the month of December 1918. We also received a beautifully framed hand colored 1873 map from George Meyer. George's parents formerly owned 63 Brunswick Avenue. The map shows the houses and businesses of Lebanon and the surrounding area. It will be hung in Borough Hall where the public can view it. Lastly, I acquired an interesting envelope that shows that the fur and hide business that was carried on in the "skunk house" was a business that was carried on for three generations of the Conover family, having been started in 1876. The 1920's envelope lists Alvah Conover as the owner successor to C.A. Conover & Sons. We already own a very interesting photo of Alvah's son, Barzilla, standing in the skunk house with his stacks of furs. It can be seen in the council room.



Did You Know?

Well, if you have read this little blurb over the years, you know that Round Valley was also known as "the Hole". Recently I came upon another name for the bowl shaped valley, Lebanon Valley. Names can change over time for both people and places making research somewhat frustrating. I recently acquired a four volume set of the letters of William Livingston. WL as we will call him was the Revolutionary Governor of New Jersey, as such; the British were very interested in capturing or killing him. Consequently, he moved around frequently. On Feb. 4, 1778 he wrote a letter to Henry Laurens, who was the president of the Continental Congress at that date. The letter was written from Lebanon Valley. A second lengthy and important letter was written the next day from the same location. In this second letter, he writes and opens with an acknowledgement of receiving a prior letter from Laurens "which I received on the road in my passage to this place on a visit to our Vice president". At this time, the Vice president was none other than John Stevens, whose farm was in the middle of Round Valley. So we have proof that the governor was in Round Valley and that Lebanon Valley is another name for this important colonial refuge.

The Shade Tree Committee

Mulch, Not Just for Springtime

After the terrible storm damage we have suffered, it is important to remember how to protect our trees and shrubs over the coming winter. Come springtime most of us rush to spread the mulch in order to reduce competing weeds and hold in moisture. But, mulch provides an important function in winter as well. Roots are damaged by the constant freezing and thawing that occurs as temperatures rise and fall above 32 degrees.

This action breaks many of the tiny feeder roots that are responsible for providing water and soil nutrients to the trees and shrubs. A cover of mulch provides some insulation that reduces the temperature swings beneath the surface, thereby keeping frozen soil frozen longer reducing damage. Remember never pile up mulch around the trunks of trees.

Storm Damage

We all know about the huge loss of trees and the resulting power outages. The storm, a powerful Northeaster, uprooted many trees and broke far more. If we had received the amount of rain predicted, the damage may have been even worse. Evergreen damage was unusually widespread; the full crowns provided too much resistance to the very high sustained winds. The wind we typically experience comes from the west and trees grow in the face of the “prevailing westerlies”. This results in trees growing both roots and crowns that have adapted to constant westerly winds. A Northeaster like Sandy hits trees from a direction that they seldom experience and have not adjusted for. The second poorest performers were the Norway maples, an invasive species that has heavy, brittle wood. Overall damage was extensive and the wounds need to be cut clean so they can heal properly and not become an entry for rot and disease. In some cases, removal is the best choice and it may be time to think about a new tree for spring planting. Finally, winter is the best time to prune trees; reducing weight and balancing the growth, while thinning the crown to reduce wind resistance, are all important reasons to prune.
