LEBANON, NJ ~ AN EXTRAORDINARY POSTAL HISTORY by Jim Walker (Part 2 of 2)

THE LEBANON EXPLOSION

Last week we gave what knowledge we could gather, before we went to press, of this terrible calamity. Our regular reporter has sent us the following very full and accurate account for this issue:

...

There were about sixty people congregated in the post office when the last evening mail was distributed and had the accident happened a half hour earlier they would have all doubtless lost their lives. As it was, nearly all of them had got their mail and repaired to their homes, with the exception of a few who strolled into the confectionery store to while away a few minutes' time gossiping with their neighbors.

Postmaster Carl Shurts had closed the office and was on his way home for the evening, when the report of the explosion came. There was a terrific detonation that could be heard for miles around, even in Somerville and Raritan, accompanied by a tearing and rending sound, and the whole building seemed to shoot right up into the air for about one hundred feet, and then settled down again with the roof about fifteen feet above the stone foundation. The sidewalls were blown outward.

...

Postmaster Carl Shurts established temporary quarters for the post office the next morning in the reading room of the Lebanon Hotel, just across the street from the wrecked building. When the explosion occurred all the mail matter in the post office including mail for the two rural delivery routes ready to go out the next morning, and some letters and papers left in the call boxes, was blown across the Cokesbury road, and the most of it landed in the dooryard at the residence of Ira B. Yawger. About \$200 worth of Liberty Bonds, owned by Mr. Shurts and in a tin box in the post office, were either blown to atoms or consumed in the flames.⁴

A Proper Sendoff: Troop 200 Retires Flags at Holjes-Sheppard Memorial Park

More than 100 American flags were retired on May 7 at a flag-retirement ceremony hosted by Boy Scout Troop 200.

The ceremony took place at the Holjes-Sheppard Memorial Park in Lebanon Borough, a place that has a special meaning to the troop. The park is named in honor of two local, fallen heroes and members of Troop 200, Lt. Frederick Y. Holjes and Warrant Officer and helicopter pilot, Robert P. Sheppard, who were killed during Vietnam. Sheppard was the troop's first Eagle Scout and the ceremony took place on the 48-year anniversary of his death.

Reverend Thomas E. Jones, pastor of the Lebanon Reformed Church and Rabbi Eric S. Cohen, PhD of the Flemington Jewish Community Center opened the ceremony up with prayers and reflections.



Michael Reino, mayor of Lebanon Borough, said he was honored to attend the ceremony and was proud to unveil the Borough's new KIA flag, which the scouts raised up on the flagpole overlooking the park.

"I cannot think of a better place to fly our new KIA flag than over the monuments of these two fallen residents," said Mayor Reino. "I want to personally thank everyone for coming out, especially our veterans. I also want to acknowledge those who are helping these scouts on their journey to adulthood. It's wonderful to see them have a sense of honor and reverence for our American traditions."

Local vexillologist and past Troop 200 Scoutmaster, Larry MOAT Friend shared his extensive knowledge about the American flag and its history. During the event, he displayed a civil-war era flag, which dates back to 1863 and has 38 stars, twelve less than today's flags. Over 150 people watched as the scouts retired the first flag.



Throughout the ceremony, members of the community were encouraged to come up and share what the flag means to them. Each branch of the Armed Services was represented and members of local VFWs, Rolling Thunder and the New Jersey State Police were also in attendance. Cub Scout Pack 190 helped retire flags, and members of the Lebanon Borough Fire Company were on hand to ensure the fire stayed contained.

As the sun was setting and the ceremony came to a close, U.S. Marine Corps veteran, Mark Paradis, Lebanon Borough's former mayor, played Taps on the bugle as the final flags were retired.

Troop 200 has been active in the Clinton Township Community since 1955, with its roots going back to the Cokesbury Methodist Church, and more recently the Lebanon Reformed Church. Today, Troop 200 meets Monday evenings at Immaculate Conception Church in Annandale, NJ. 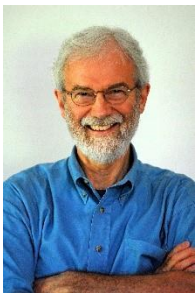


We are open on the second and fourth Tuesday of each month 10-noon and 5-7.

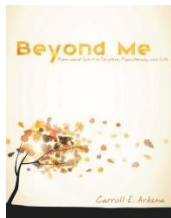
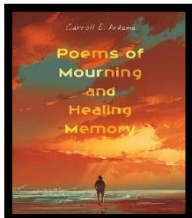
Intersection of Art, Faith & Life : A Poetry Reading

LBS is a wonderful place to learn and work. As I conclude my first year as Chief School Administrator, I am constantly amazed at the quality of the teaching and learning, the level of character that our children display, and the support of this community for all that we do.

The words above are basically how I started my last submission for the Lantern. Those words continue to ring true. Our school district is a tiny gem in Hunterdon County. The experience that we are able to provide for our students is an example of the power of small schools! Additionally, the fiscally responsible fashion with which our Board of Education and staff achieve this is truly special. As you may be aware, the Board of Education approved our 2% increase in budget, as per state cap, during our April Board Meeting. This budget information can be found on our website at www.lebanonschool.org. The approved budget amounted to a 1 cent increase per one hundred dollars of assessed value. This is a thirty dollar (\$30) increase for the year in school taxes for a house assessed at \$300,000. With this modest increase, we are able to maintain our excellent program and continually improve.

Our budget supports our strong academic program consisting of our general and special education programs. We are able to offer a comprehensive curriculum with both traditional (text based) materials and modern, technology based resources to deliver instruction. Teachers and students have access to SmartBoards in their classrooms. Each child is assigned a device (currently iPads and Chromebooks moving forward.) Our “specials” instruction provides our children with experiences to broaden their view of learning and develop their talents. Both the art and music programs were on display at our wonderful Band/Orchestra and Wizard of Oz performance on May 31st! The talents of our children are clearly nurtured through these programs. We are able to offer physical education regularly as well as extra-curricular offerings that range from sports to clubs and activities such as Student Council, TREP\$, Reading Olympics, and more. Our children have access to field trips to educational locations and virtual field trips via our technology. Our technology and enrichment programs provide students with an opportunity to expand of their curriculum and explore creativity in various ways.

We also use our school budget to maintain a school building that serves as the centerpiece of the Lebanon Borough Community. We continually work to maintain and improve the building to ensure that it is a wonderful place to learn, work, and gather as a community. We have improved our efficiency, safety and security measures over the past years with a new entrance to the school, camera upgrades and additions, and various other system upgrades (heating, water, etc.) in the school. We will continue to monitor and address any needs or improvements to the building moving forward.

A wonderful development of which we are very proud is our new home on the internet! Please take some time to visit us at www.lebanonschool.org. You will find a much more user-friendly and informative website with a host of information about our school and community. The website is responsive, which means that it is easily viewable on mobile devices. You should have a smooth and positive experience regardless of what device you use to view the site! There is also a survey posted to gather information about your experience. We designed the site based upon an initial survey that was conducted in the Fall, and want to make sure that it continually improves to meet the needs of the school and greater community. The survey takes about 3-5 minutes.

Another wonderful program that we have at our school is the Safety Patrol. Lebanon Borough School is pleased to announce the 2018 LBS Outstanding School Safety Patroller of the Year. This annual award is given to the safety patroller who goes above and beyond their patrol duties on a regular basis, and who has made a difference in keeping students safe at our school.



This year's award recipient is fifth grade safety patroller Riqui Cosano. Throughout the school year, Riqui has exhibited the 7 qualities of an outstanding school safety patroller: dependable, polite and courteous, good role model, trustworthy, respectful, proud, and diligent.

Congratulations, Riqui, on a job well done!

I would like to take a moment here to thank the LBS community for welcoming me this year. It is a pleasure to lead a learning community that is passionate about collaborating for the benefit of all of the children. Around the School

Enrichment/Technology...

For grades 3-6, May was PARCC testing time, and fifth grade also took the Science test online for the first time. To balance out the silence and concentration needed for the testing, we used OSMO during afternoon classes in grades 3-6. OSMO is an interactive, hands-on system using iPads together with outside materials, to provide creative thinking and cooperative experiences. Everyone worked in groups of two or three, and during each class period the groups went to one OSMO activity, switching the next class to a different activity (we have six). It's been a perfect antidote to the morning testing routine!



Meanwhile, grades K-2 continued their unit on Houses and Homes. I read "A House is a House for Me", and we all brainstormed things that could be houses for other things...an amazing amount of imagination and creativity went into this in all three classes! After reading another book, "If I Built a House", the classes drew their idea of the perfect house, and wrote about it. More imagination and creativity shined through! Now we are rotating in small groups to build houses from Legos, Lincoln Logs, Tinker Toys, and straws.

In June, I will be doing the third round of oral reading fluency assessment (also done in September and January) for all students in grades K-6. We will also be doing some fun reading & drawing /writing activities, as well as Lego machines, robots, and apps using logical thinking/problem-solving.

Spring Concert/Show

On May 31st, our entire school performed at the Spring Concert/Show. This included our instrumental groups performing several numbers each and wowing the audience with how much they have grown during the school year. Those were followed by the whole school performance of The Wizard of Oz. The children worked for weeks during and after school to prepare for this show. The assistance of parents and teachers made the sets, costumes, and practice time possible to put on this elaborate show. The evening was a great success and the children were magnificent. The event was well attended and it was unanimous that Lebanon's Got Talent!





Preschool...

This year the preschoolers have been busy. We have learned and reviewed all the letters of the alphabet, and we used the abc's to countdown to the end of the year. Each day we have an activity with the letter. Ex: A- stuffed Animal day, B- favorite Book day, H- hat day, Y- wear yellow day. We complete end of the year assessments to see how much we learned this year. We continued to work on rhyming, opposites, numbers, and writing numbers. The afternoon class has been working hard to get ready for the spring show, and did an awesome job. During June, both classes participated in field day, and we also tie-dyed shirts for field day. We learned all about Recycling, we used soda bottles to plant flowers, we used the same bottles to bowl in the classroom, and we made a marble art world. We made special projects for Mother's Day and Father's Day, and we learned the life cycle of a butterfly and frog. We spent a lot of time outside on the playground! This year we also completed units on

seasons, holidays, clothing, feelings/emotions, buildings, and recycling. We participated in many science experiments as we created our own rain in a cup, made our own lava lamps, saw what warm water did to skittles, watched what happens to ice in different temperature water, planted seeds and watched them grow, saw what happened to pepper when we had dish soap on our finger and watched a volcano erupt. All the preschoolers are ready for a relaxing summer break. Our PM students are ready to begin Kindergarten in September!

Kindergarten...

During the past few weeks of school, we have been focusing on reading and writing and getting ready for 1st grade! The children's reading and writing abilities have flourished, especially in the last few months of school. I am so proud of how far they have come this year! Some of the children are even creating their own stories, which is a teacher's dream for them to enjoy reading and writing on their own accord!

We wrote notes to our Moms for Mother's Day on Shrinky Dinks to create a keepsake keychain. The children were amazed to watch their notes shrink down right before their eyes! MAGIC!

In science, while learning about plants, we were able to grow sweet potato slips from a sweet potato. The children were shocked that things can grow from things other than seeds. We will be planting the sweet potato slips in the school garden. We hope to see some sweet potatoes in the fall from our plants, maybe even eat them!

We also had a fabulous trip to the DaVinci Science Center in Allentown, PA, on May 2nd. The children were able to see an electricity show, explore dinosaur fossils, invent using our imagination, and many other interactive activities.

In math, we are wrapping up our year exploring sorting objects and exploring graphs. The Kindergarteners are ready for first grade with counting to 100+, writing numbers 1-100, naming 2 & 3 dimensional shapes! I hope everyone has a wonderful and restful summer.

First Grade...

Last Month we celebrated all of the amazing moms with a belated mother's day breakfast complete with coffee, tea, bagels, and fruit. During this time, the students shared their books they wrote about their mothers. It was a wonderful time to remember all of the things our awesome moms do for us! We look forward to celebrating all of the incredible dads with our Donuts with Dad celebration in June. In science, the students have enjoyed learning about plants and observing their changes as they grow from a seedling to plant. We've planted sunflowers outside and radishes inside. We're excited to see how tall our sunflowers get as we get closer to the start of summer! Our final unit in Science will be Lights & Sound. This unit will help the students understand that by exploring the properties of light and sound, people can create fun and useful things.

In Language Arts, we are almost done with our final unit in our Reading Street books. We've read many animal fantasy books, informational fiction books, and we will soon be reading about simple machines. We continue to work on our fluency by reading familiar poems, practicing our sight words, and using independent reading time to read with expression and appropriate phrasing. During many days in June, we will be taking a break from our Reading Street books to review concepts like main idea and supporting details, summarizing, making inferences, and author's purpose.

In Math, we are completing our unit on 3-dimensional and 2-dimensional shapes. The students have learned about the properties and attributes of shapes, and discovered how to put together and decompose plane shapes. In our last unit of Go Math, we will be learning about Measurement. The students will be using nonstandard units to measure length and learn how to tell time on both a digital and analog clock. Our 1st grade class has learned so much this year and we are ready to enjoy summer, come back refreshed, and ready to start 2nd Grade! Have a safe and relaxing summer!

Second Grade...

The second grade class has been working very hard. They are working to develop their writing skills and organize their writing into paragraphs. They have been writing letters, nonfiction and fiction pieces, as well as other forms



of writing. The class has also been building their reading fluency.

In March, the students created a class book through a writing process. We read a variety of winter stories. They completed graphic organizers and rough drafts and then used their ideas to create final drafts for the book. Next, they illustrated their pages to match their writing. We turned these pieces into a book called: Winter Wonderland. It was printed and the students were able to learn about the publishing process and become authors. They were very excited to see their work in a book!

Early this winter, the students also worked hard in social studies to learn about the Native American culture. They used this information to create a Native American Shelter. This was a homework project that they presented to the class. The students did an excellent job reviewing what they know about each shelter and presenting their work. They completed another home assignment about their cultures and traditions that they also presented to the class.



During the winter, the second grade class learned to solve two and three digit addition and subtraction problems with regrouping, measurement using a variety of units. They also learned to collect data, which we connected with science by creating a bar graph to measure the temperature. More recently, we worked on geometry. They learned to draw and recognize two-dimensional and three-dimensional shapes. The class and I have also been working to maintain plants in our school's hydroponic center. We learned what plants need to survive and how to take care of them in the system. The students and I have also been growing different plants in soil. They view and record their plant's growth in their science journals periodically.

Third Grade...

It has been a wonderful year in 3rd grade - learning and discovering together! This year was filled with many new experiences, such as writing that developed their individual voice as authors. They had many opportunities this year to create poems, stories, and dramas with plot and well developed characters. Students also wrote opinion pieces and personal pieces, such as autobiographies. Students also read many styles of writing from realistic fiction to biography and folktales. They have enjoyed more difficult independent novel reading as they prepare for fourth grade. In math, 3rd graders tackled their multiplication memorization, and have deepened their math skills to solve complex word problems that involve geometry, measurement, and fractions. In science, we have learned about the Earth in its the solar system, and its patterns of weather and water. We also learned about plants and animals, and their unique life cycles. In social studies, we focused on communities, citizenship, government, civil rights, and state regions to learn in June. We also plan to meet with families in June, as we did this past fall, to share both our writing accomplishments and our cultural heritage. This week in reading, 3rd Graders will be focusing on cultures in both reading and social studies, and the effect cultures have on the way we live together in this great nation. We will understand how different ways of life come together and contribute to new and wonderful experiences for all. In math, we are working on 4th Grade readiness skills. We will also use our geometry skills in a STEM activity for deeper understanding in architecture. In science, we are researching planets and discovering how different the planets are from one another. We're also writing postcards from our planet to express our planetary knowledge

It has been a terrific year in 3rd Grade this year, and I look forward to watching this group of students grow as learners as they move upward to 4th Grade and beyond.

Fourth Grade...

Fourth graders have been hard at work gearing up for our June Wax Museum! While reading a biography of a chosen figure, students learned how to take notes and pull out the important information. From there, the students were able to make a Timeline based on the important moments/achievements in their important figure's life and organize it in chronological order. Next, students wrote a speech from the point of view of their person. This speech highlights the achievements, the struggles, and important or interesting facts from their figure's life. Each speech

starts with an interesting hook to get the listeners' attention, and the fourth grade has begun practicing/memorizing their speeches and working speed, volume, eye contact and excitement. On the day of the Wax Museum, each Fourth Grade student will be posed as a wax figure and will "magically" come to life briefly to give us their speech and teach us about "their" live through a button. We are so excited for this day and have been working hard on this for quite a while! This is a great moment to highlight all the growth our Fourth Graders have achieved this year in all areas of ELA!

Mathematically speaking, now that Fourth Grade has mastered long division, multiplying two digits by two digits and all things fractions (finding equivalent, adding, subtracting and multiplying by a whole number!), area/perimeter, angles, and decimals, we are ready to take on two-dimensional figures! Fourth grade math covers such a vast span of skills and these kids are rocking it!

In Social Studies, we have wrapped up our Unit on the Civil War and the Underground Railroad, focusing on how New Jersey was affected and involved. This year, we have learned about our earliest people in the area (Lenape) and explored all the way through the end of the Civil War. We all agree that New Jersey not only has played an important part in our country's history, but is a really great place to be!

In Science, we have begun exploring the mysteries of sounds and waves. We are really enjoying learning through Mystery Science, where we navigate through a mystery questions posed and learn while we test things out! From bridges, to volcanos, ecosystems and landslides, we have loved exploring and learning through investigation!

Fifth Grade...

As the 5th grade class heads into June with PARCC testing over and only 3 weeks of school remaining, you might think we are slowing down. In reality, we are full steam ahead with many exciting things happening right up until June 22nd! We recently completed our final selection from our Reading Street series, which was the story of "King Midas and the Golden Touch." The students easily identified the lesson of the story, which is to be careful what you wish for! We will spend the remaining couple of weeks reading our last class novel, the thoroughly entertaining *HOLES*.

In addition to reading the novel, the students are hard at work writing and illustrating their own individual books. These books will be a personal memoir of a place that is memorable for them, using the writing skills and techniques they've learned throughout the year. Their stories will be full of figurative language including similes, metaphors, personifications, and alliterations. The stories will be presented to parents at our "Authors' Tea" on June 18th and 19th. In Math, we have completed all of the chapters in our book (wow!) and will spend the remaining weeks on a unit called "Getting Ready for 6th Grade Math". I know these kids will be very successful sixth graders! Our class is also working on a series of short skits to present to the entire school on June 7th, to demonstrate our sixth and final Character pillar, which is *Trustworthiness*. In the midst of all this, we are also looking forward to Field Day on June 5th, and our Grade 3-6 field trip to the Lehigh Valley Zoo on June 11th! We have a very busy few weeks ahead of us! I will be terribly sad to reach the end of my time with this wonderful group of children, but am excited to see their accomplishments in the years ahead! They are remarkable individuals!

Sixth Grade...

It hardly seems possible that we have reached the end of 6th grade so quickly! In September, we cringed at the thought of "algebra." Now we solve for unknown variables without a second thought. Eeking out a paragraph or two was a painful process, and now we labor over 5 paragraph essays. We have covered 5 novels as a class and are finishing the 6th by next week. We have read fiction and non-fiction, written narratives and analyses, learned new vocabulary and grammar diagramming. During the year, we have covered life science, earth science and even some physical science! We are no longer new 6th graders, we are almost 7th graders, ready for the new adventure that is Jr. High. As we prepare ourselves to celebrate our achievements at Lebanon Borough School in our promotion ceremony this month, we look back and realize that this year has been a year of growth toward our next chapter.

When non-recyclable items (contamination) end up in your recycling loads, they have the potential to turn the entire load into trash and increase processing costs resulting in contamination and/or additional service charges.
