Hello Lebanon!

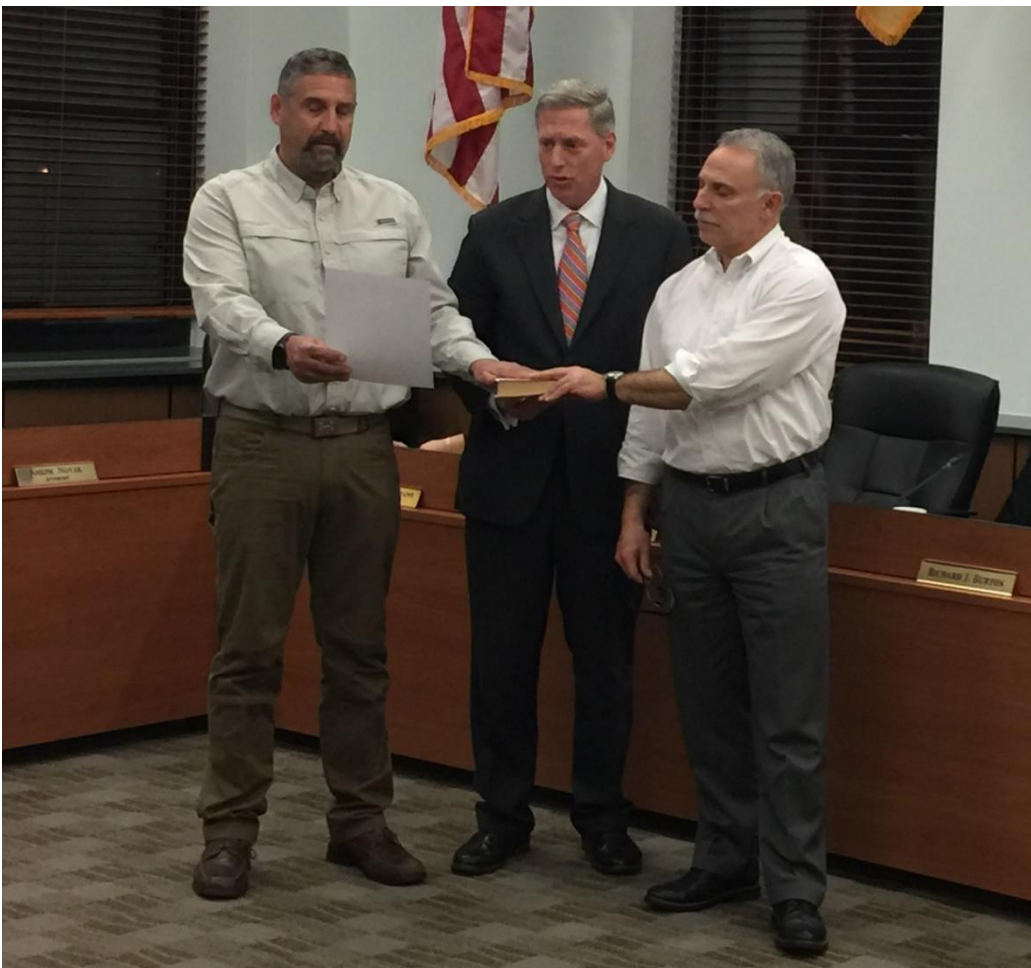

Assemblyman Erik Peterson administered the Oath of Office to Councilman Rich Burton and Councilman Sam Berger as they continue their service for the Borough of Lebanon.

We received some good news from an alert Borough resident. They found on the internet a listing for documents in the archives of the Hunterdon County Historical Society (HCHS) that includes records from the Lebanon Telephone Co. spanning the period of 1901-1910. The archive was donated in 2017, and arrangements have been made to review it. Years ago, the Borough History Committee presented an hour long presentation titled "The Telephone Comes to Lebanon". Since then we were fortunate to locate a stash of 113 documents from 1910 to 1920, including many billheads from local merchants. These two sources will add greatly to our knowledge of the history of the company that connected all of Hunterdon County

The previous Lantern related the tragedy of the 1918 explosion and the resilience of the community. We recently located a newspaper article that reported that the Odd Fellows had in ten years paid off the mortgage for the new building.

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Lebanon Lodge Clears Debt. Fire 10 Years Ago Took 11 Lives

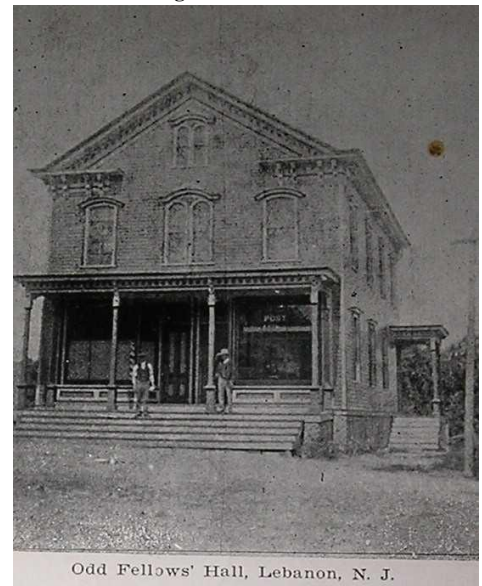
LEBANON, Dec. 3.—After ten years of strenuous work, members of Vesper Lodge, No. 239, Independent Order of Odd Fellows, will burn the mortgage of their building the latter part of this month. The event will come just ten years after the worst fire this town has ever experienced, the disastrous blaze which destroyed the lodge's former structure, resulting in the death of eleven persons.

Present at the ceremonies will be Walter S. Campbell, of East Orange Grand Master of the I. O. O. F. He will be one of the principal speakers. Others who will talk will be Chester Tomson, former Mayor of Clinton; former County Clerk Harvey S. Hopkins, of Sussex; Clinton Baker, of Newark, Past Grand Master; Harry S. Pina, of Trenton, Grand Secretary, and Past Grand Master Robert B. Croot, of Washington, N. J., former Senator from Warren County.

In the fire that destroyed the old building of the lodge, ten of the eleven men who were burned to death were Vesper Lodgmen making arrangements for a coming installation. They were the late Furman Alpaugh, Clarence Emmons, Wesley F. Bird, Peter S. Niper, Oscar Apgar, Joseph C. Striker, John Smock, Henry Bragg, Russell Hockenburgh and George Michaelson. Leslie Apgar, another member, died several days later in an Easton hospital.



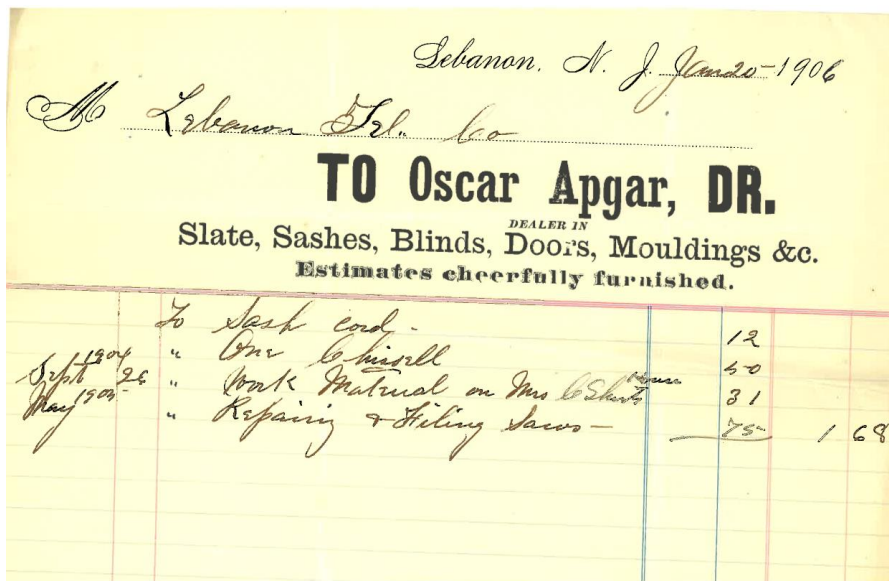

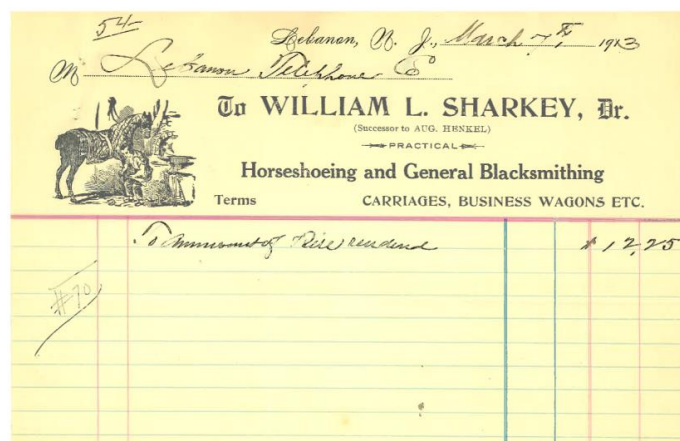
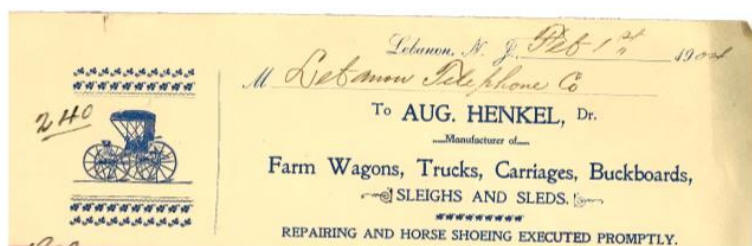

One of the fatalities was Oscar Apgar who owned a business that made blinds, window sash, moldings and shingles. The business was located in the building where Dr. Thorne now has his dental practice. The picture is rather grainy but it does show the sign painted on the wall and probably Oscar and his two sons Leslie and Ted. We also have a billhead for a purchase by the phone company from Oscar.



Directly across the street was a large wagon maker's factory owned in 1900 by August Henkel, the photo has some losses (sometimes you have to be happy with what little you can find). We have a few billheads from Mr. Henkel and one from his successor Mr. Sharkey.

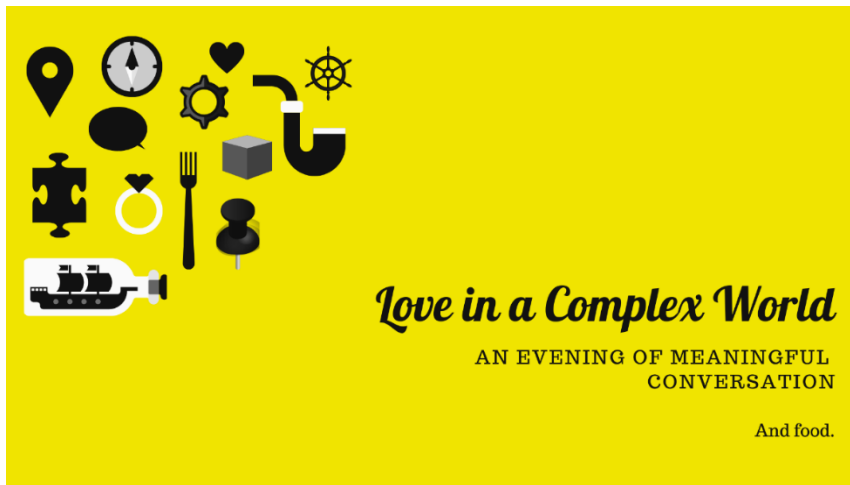

Our parents, staff, and community are committed to ensuring that the children of Lebanon Borough are afforded the best opportunities throughout the school year. In the interest of conserving space in the Lantern and providing highlighted information, we will not provide the detailed summaries of each grade level’s program here. However, if you are interested, this information is included in our monthly newsletter, *The Wildcat’s Roar*, which is posted to our website at the beginning of each month. I encourage the community to visit our website regularly because there is always important information available.

The district has commissioned a feasibility study to report on the impacts of changing the send/receive relationship for our 7th and 8th grades students from Clinton Township Middle School to Clinton Public School. Once this report is complete, it will be presented at a public Board of Education meeting. Prior to this meeting, we will inform LBS families via our Friday emails and the community through our district website.

Our Preschool program continues to grow and improve. The teachers and students have had a wonderful year. The split to a 3-year-old and a 4-year-old class has been a smooth transition, and the students' developmental needs are addressed in each class. Please note that we will have our Preschool Orientation on April 2, 2019, at 9:30 am. If you, or anyone you know, has a 3 or 4-year-old child and is interested in our program, please have them contact the main office at (908) 236-2448. Additionally, our Kindergarten Orientation will be held on April 2, 2019 at 11:00 am. Over the past months, we have held our winter concert, where our students demonstrated their musical gifts. LBS puts on two whole school shows per year that include both instrumental performances and a whole-school musical performance. This spring our students will be performing *The Little Mermaid Jr.* on June 5th at 6:30 pm. Come and enjoy the show! One of the indicators of a strong educational system is a commitment to the arts. In Lebanon Borough, there is an understanding that the arts provide our students with opportunities to engage in activities that provide them with benefits beyond reading, writing, and arithmetic. Additionally, we will also be having our annual Young Artist Showcase at the Hunterdon Art Museum opening reception, Saturday, May 4, 2019. This is a great opportunity to see our students artwork displayed in a professional setting. As a community, we are committed to ensuring that our children are afforded these opportunities.

During the winter, in Technology, all grades K-6 focused on coding using code.org courses. They became familiar with coding concepts such as sequence, commands, code, program, algorithm, bugs & debugging, conditionals (if-then-else), and loops (repeating a command). A very important aspect

of coding is the ability to think, persevere and problem-solve - life-long skills! It is important that while we continue to ensure that our students are strong in the basic core areas of education, we are also developing critical thinkers, who are familiar with the modern tools of education and the workplace.

Character education and socialization are imperative objectives of public education if we are to produce citizens who are capable of cooperation, collaboration, and interdependence in the workplace of the future. We do this by emphasizing trustworthiness, respect, responsibility, honesty, fairness, caring, and everyday good citizenship at Lebanon Borough Elementary School. Our students focus on various components of character each month and one of our grade levels leads an assembly for the entire school that exemplifies and teaches about the character trait. Last month our 1st-grade students and staff led the school in our Fairness assembly.

Our PTA continues to be an integral part of our school's success and supports the learning and activities that happen each day. In the Fall, the organization held its major Basket Auction fundraiser, which helps to fund assemblies, materials, and other school activities. One of the Auction prizes was an opportunity for a student to be principal for a day. Avery and Allie Borzelli were the lucky students, who got to spend the day leading the school as co-principals. They got to make a rule for the day, run a safety drill, and observe classrooms. All of the students were very respectful and congratulated them on the wonderful job they did! Family fun nights have been well attended this year and our PTA helps our school remain the hub of the Lebanon community.

As we look to the Spring, we are anxiously awaiting the nicer weather. The school is always abuzz this time of year with field trips and outdoor activities. These help to break up the days that we are administering state assessments in grades 3-6. The students are anxiously awaiting our Field Day in early June. As I said in the first sentence, LBS is a wonderful place to learn and work!

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WHAT IS STORMWATER POLLUTION?

Water from rain and melting snow that flows over lawns, parking lots and streets is known as stormwater runoff. This water, which travels along gutters, into catch basins and through storm drain pipes and ditches, usually is not treated, but then flows or is discharged into local water-bodies. Along the way, the stormwater picks up trash (fast-food wrappers, cigarette butts, styrofoam cups, etc.) and toxins and other pollutants (gas, motor oil, antifreeze,



fertilizers, pesti-cides and pet droppings). This polluted stormwater can kill fish and other wildlife, destroy wild-life habitat, contaminate drinking water sources and force the closing of beaches because of health threats to swimmers.

Human activity is largely responsible for the stormwater pollution. Everything that we put on the ground or into the storm drain can end up in our water. Each of us has a responsibility to make sure these contaminants stay out of our water. Whether we have clean water is up to you.

When you're washing your car in the driveway, remember you're not just washing your car in the driveway.

Solutions to Stormwater Pollution

Easy Things You Can Do Every Day To Protect Our Water

A Guide to Healthy Habits for Cleaner Water

Pollution on streets, parking lots and lawns is washed by rain into storm drains, then directly to our drinking water supplies and the ocean and lakes our children play in. Fertilizer, oil, pesticides, detergents, pet waste, grass clippings: You name it and it ends up in our water.

Stormwater pollution is one of New Jersey's greatest threats to clean and plentiful water, and that's why we're all doing something about it.

By sharing the responsibility and making small, easy changes in our daily lives, we can keep common pollutants out of stormwater. It all adds up to cleaner water, and it saves the high cost of cleaning up once it's dirty.

As part of New Jersey's initiative to keep our water clean and plentiful and to meet federal requirements, many municipalities and other public agencies including colleges and military bases must adopt ordinances or other rules prohibiting various activities that contribute to stormwater pollution. Breaking these rules can result in fines or other penalties.



As a resident, business, or other member of the New Jersey community, it is important to know these easy things you can do every day to protect our water.

Limit your use of fertilizers and pesticides

- Do a soil test to see if you need a fertilizer.
- Do not apply fertilizers if heavy rain is predicted.
- Look into alternatives for pesticides.
- Maintain a small lawn and keep the rest of your property or yard in a natural state with trees and other native vegetation that requires little or no fertilizer.
- If you use fertilizers and pesticides, follow the instructions on the label on how to correctly apply it.



Make sure you properly store or discard any unused portions.

Properly use and dispose of hazardous products

- Hazardous products include some household or commercial cleaning products, lawn and garden care products, motor oil, antifreeze, and paints.
- Do not pour any hazardous products down a storm drain because storm drains are usually connected to local waterbodies and the water is not treated.

- If you have hazardous products in your home or workplace, make sure you store or dispose of them properly. Read the label for guidance.

- Use natural or less toxic alternatives when possible.

- Recycle used motor oil.

- Contact your municipality, county or facility management office for the locations of hazardous-waste disposal facilities.



Keep pollution out of storm drains

- Municipalities and many other public agencies are required to mark certain storm drain inlets with messages reminding people that storm drains are connected to local waterbodies.

- Do not let sewage or other wastes flow into a stormwater system.

Clean up after your pet

- Many municipalities and public agencies must enact and enforce local pet-waste rules.

- An example is requiring pet owners or their keepers to pick up and properly dispose of pet waste dropped on public or other people's property.

- Make sure you know your town's or agency's requirements and comply with them. It's the law. And remember to:

- Use newspaper, bags or pooper-scoopers to pick up wastes.

- Dispose of the wrapped pet waste in the trash or unwrapped in a toilet.

- Never discard pet waste in a storm drain.

Don't feed wildlife

- Do not feed wildlife, such as ducks and geese, in public areas.

- Many municipalities and other public agencies must enact and enforce a rule that prohibits wildlife feeding in these areas.



Don't litter

- Place litter in trash receptacles.

- Recycle. Recycle. Recycle.

- Participate in community cleanups.

Dispose of yard waste properly

- Keep leaves and grass out of storm drains.

- If your municipality or agency has yard waste collection rules, follow them.

- Use leaves and grass clippings as a resource for compost.

- Use a mulching mower that recycles grass clippings into the lawn.

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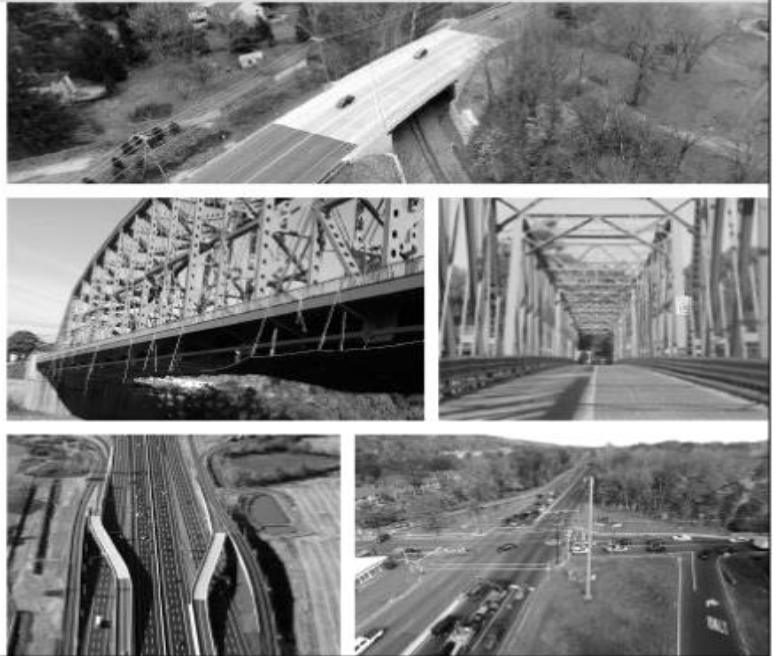
